How are the genetic resources used in biotechnology governed and regulated? Drawing on in-depth case studies, this talk will discuss how material and digital genetic resources are governed, with particular focus on Access and Benefit Sharing. Based on Institutional Resource Regime, which combines public policy analysis and institutional economics of property rights, the talk compares and contrasts different cases of biotechnological utilization of such resources and how they are regulated.

# Effect of Combat on Veterans' Economic Transitions

Joseph Sabia, Professor of Economics San Diego State University

Join Professor Joseph Sabia as he talks about the first study to estimate the impact of post-9/11 combat deployments on the economic transitions of separating veterans. Findings show that combat deployments increase subsequent reliance on the Unemployment Compensation for Separating Veterans (UCX) and Veteran Disability Compensation (VDC) programs. Research also suggests that unit-level combat exposure is associated with a reduction in the probability of Post-9/11 GI Bill take-up and diminished educational attainment.

Brown v. Board of Education (1954) holds the unique distinction of being both the most famous Supreme Court decision since Marbury v. Madison (1803) and the most well-known to the American public. In striking down state-sponsored racial segregation in public education, a unanimous Supreme Court pierced the legal architecture of American apartheid where it would have the most profound impact. But Brown did not emerge overnight; it was the product of an almost twenty-year litigation campaign by the NAACP Legal Defense Fund to dismantle "separate but equal" interpretation of the Fourteenth Amendment. And it was not without controversy, as an idea, as a decision and then in the struggle to implement the ruling. This course will focus solely on Brown, beginning with a review of the history of African American education in the United States; the formalization Jim Crow; how discrimination in housing and employment affected access to education; the complex relationship of the NAACP with other civil rights organizations; the evolving role of the federal government in race law litigation; and how Brown continues to affect contemporary dialogue on civil rights beyond education.





#### How Far Is Too Far? New Evidence on Abortion Clinic Closures, Access, and Abortions

Join us as Jason Lindo, Associate Professor at Texas A&M University, presents his research on the effects of abortion-clinic closures on clinic access and abortions. The evidence is based on Texas' recent history, and on the consequences of Texas HB2 in particular, a controversial law that shuttered nearly half of Texas' abortion clinics in late 2013 before two of its key provisions were deemed unconstitutional by the US Supreme Court in 2016. The results suggest large and statistically significant impacts on abortion rates driven in part by increased distance from abortion clinics and in part by increased waiting times at clinics.
